Hello Evan,

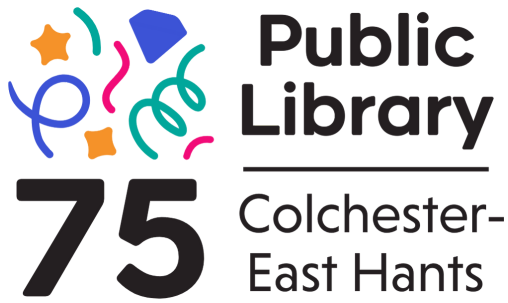
I'm writing to request repair and paving for the driveway and parking lot at the Mount Uniacke Library. I understand the driveway and street entrance were re-graded recently, which is very helpful and much appreciated, but unfortunately does not fully address the problem.

The potholes and unevenness of the parking lot present serious hazards for people with mobility issues. There is also a significant difference between the surface of the entrance ramp/walkway and that of the parking lot, wherein the parking lot is much lower than the edge of the ramp. These are both significant barriers to accessibility of the library, as well as potential dangers for tripping or other injuries.

Paving the lot and driveway would not only address these accessibility and safety concerns, it would also allow for better services year-round. In particular, ice and snow build-up in winter would be more easily dealt with by plowing and winter maintenance services. Again, this would provide better accessibility to the library and safer conditions for pedestrians and vehicles.
